Orientation Week continues to be the most important opportunity that the Students' Union has to brand itself to all incoming students.

Meet your SU sessions have been a great introduction for first year students during Orientation Week to the SU. We continued with the format of a short video, followed by an info session hosted by a member of SLC where students were able to ask questions to the five Executive in attendance.

This year at Night on the SU we showed Kick-ass. The

Executives hosted a few "minute-to-win-it" games for 30

minutes prior to the start of the movie. These games proved to be more engaging then previous years.

Kickoff remained on the Friday of Orientation Week. We hosted the tailgate party full of interactive bouncers and music which drew in 531 students. Our partnership with Leadership & Student Engagement has been good for both organizations. However, for 2018/2019 orientation will be condensed down to two days and with shifts in priorities we will be working on our own orientation to provide support to new students. Our giveaways and swag continue to be some of the most popular items sought after during the week and SU sunglasses are worn all year long. We gave away 2850 notebooks and 2800 sunglasses.

Cinemania is one of the Students' Unions longest running programs. This year, there was a dramatic decrease in attendance to Cinemania again. Which can be attributed to how much easier it is to stream and download movies. With the consistent pattern of low turnout over the past several years Cinemania

was cancelled for the winter semester and replaced with the SU Social which will be hosted once per semester.

Our first SU social was held on Tuesday April 3<sup>rd</sup>, from 6 to 9pm in the Den and had a Riverdale theme. There was a turnout of 342 people, with 48 teams and individuals participating in 7 rounds of trivia. Seven gift cards for The Den valued at \$10 each were given to winners of each round. A special menu was created for the night and we ran out of milkshakes an hour into the event. SU Socials are meant to look different each semester and will allow the SU to hold events that are relevant to that time and engage positively with students.



The Students' Union Undergraduate Research Symposium (URS) gives students an opportunity to showcase research alongside other undergraduate researchers from across campus. In 2016, the SU received 119 applications from students to participate in the 11th annual event. Submissions increased to 137 for 2017 with most applications being submitted on the last day from a variety of faculties on campus.

Through a solid partnership with staff at the Taylor Family Digital Library, URS was once again well promoted at the library and student work continues to be showcased through the U of C's institutional repository.

The SU Undergraduate Research Symposium's financial support continues to grow each year because of the generosity of U of C departments and faculties. This year \$25,250 was awarded to students on

December 6, 2017 at a formal ceremony. A full list of awards and winners is attached as Appendix I.

The seventh annual Calgary Leaders' Dinner was held on January 18<sup>th</sup>, 2018. The event is a great opportunity for student leaders to meet Calgary's federal, provincial and municipal leaders over dinner to discuss current issues and gain insight from their experience in leadership and government in an informal setting. All of Calgary's elected leaders from all three levels of government were invited to attend of which 21 came for either dinner or cocktail hour. Sex Week is a week of workshops that the SU helps organize and runs in partnership with the Women's Resource Centre (WRC) and the SU Wellness Centre. This is an information and outreach week that informs students about sexual and gender wellness. Eighteen workshops and activities were offered this year. This year's Carnival was set up with passports and the games in the middle the courtyard which increased participation and interaction with all of our table vendors.

The Q Centre hosted the following during Sex Week:

- Sex Week Carnival: Educated students about STI's and sexual and gender wellness in a fun, low commitment setting.
- Queer Sex Education: Topics included healthy relationships, consent, and queer sexuality education.

- Binder Workshop: feature some tips and tricks for finding the proper fitting binder, important information about wear time.
- DRAG: A safe gender bending space with a variety of extremely talented special guests.
- Trans 101: to educate people on basic trans and non-normative identities and provide resources.
- Alphabet Soup: an educational introduction to the LGBTQ+ community that discusses the complexities in language, and how to respectfully discuss queer topics.
- BDSM 201: A discussion on taking BDSM further, including discussion of how kink plays into different types of relationship.
- BDSM 301: Edge Play and Lifestyle

#### **5.7 Destress Packs**

Destress Packs were an initiative started by the 70<sup>th</sup> SU Executive to help combat exam time stress for students on campus and was continued this year. This year the packs included: a granola bar, apple, tea, headphones, slurpee coupon, sudoku, lip balm, candy, encouraging note and chocolate. The packs also included a pamphlet with information about mental health resources on campus as well as study spaces. This year we were able to purchase fabric drawstring bags again to build the destress packs.

Online nominations for outstanding professors and teaching assistants teaching undergraduate courses from all faculties were once again accepted in both the fall and winter. The nomination period is approximately six weeks long in each semester and during this time various methods are used to

promote the TEA program, including a strong social media presence through the SU Facebook, Instagram, and Twitter accounts.

At a formal ceremony on April 18, 2018, the SU Teaching Excellence Awards Committee awarded 29 professors and teaching assistants with TEA awards, while 10 individuals received honorable mentions. The SU will continue to work with faculty deans and the SU Elected Officials to promote this important academic initiative to students and recognize instructors across campus.
